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Ice Out – What's Next?

At the March YFC meeting, local guide Noah Humfeld presented a seasonal breakdown of what fish to target and how to catch them in the Madison chain until the ice forms next fall.

With bass fishing open all year now, at least for catch and release fishing, Noah recommends targeting bass from ice out into May. For largemouth bass find the warmest water and fish with a lipless crankbait, swimbait, blade bait, jigs, or spinnerbaits. Pick a sunny day to fish. Most fish will be in five to twelve feet of water. One place he recommended is Upper Mud Lake. Look for green weeds.

Early smallmouth bass are harder to catch. Fish rock bars, sand flats, or sand to rock transition areas. Use Ned rigs, drop shots, or tubes and fish them ultra slow. Drag them right along the bottom.

May is walleye month. The most productive technique, but more work, is to troll stick baits with trolling boards at night in shallow water (3 to 6 feet deep). Look for sand flats or shallow rocks. Look for areas of water temperature changes and watch the wind. Stealth is the key as water is usually clear this time of year and you are fishing in shallow waters.

Walleyes can be caught by casting this time of year but retrieve very slowly – twitch, twitch, pause. The pause should be 10 seconds or more.

SHOOT FOR THE MOON

At our April 10th meeting, professional guide Adam Oberfoell will discuss understanding lunar phases for better fishing. He can also tell you about catching big muskies on Madison-area lakes! The meeting starts at 7 but arrive at 6 p.m. for a mini session by Stan Nichols, on how to make and use quick and easy poppers and bluegill flies.

<u>Notes from the President start on page 2</u> <u>Spring club outing opportunities on page 4</u> Walleyes can also be caught during the day but look for them in 15 to 30 feet of water. Use crawler harnesses or stick baits, cover a lot of water, and use your electronics. Troll the top half of the water column; troll at 1.5 to 2 miles per hour, and keep the boat away from the lures. Let out the line about two times the water depth you want to fish.

For skinny water walleyes in May, try shallow water sand flats and bays where the vegetation is starting to grow. Use small crankbaits. The best bite seems to be from morning to mid-day. The bite can really be hit or miss. Monona Bay and Squaw Bay are two recommended areas to try.

June and July are catch everything months and drop shot is the catch everything technique. Plastics work but one-half nightcrawler or a minnow works better. Fish weed edges, rock structure, and main lake points. Place the dropshot hook about 15 inches above the weight. Depending on depth Noah uses a one-sixteenth to one-quarter once weight.

Mid- to late June is the start of musky fishing. Noah doesn't start musky fishing until the water is at least 65 degrees or warmer. He usually doesn't fish muskies when water temperatures are over 80 degrees. But when water temperatures drop back to around 65 degrees in late August it is prime musky fishing time. Topwater baits are his favorite. If the weather is hot, two days after a cold front can be really good. Musky fishing is good because many of the pelagic fish are returning to shallow water structure. This concentrates prey fish that have been spread out all summer.

Fall fishing – don't bother fishing during fall turnover. This usually occurs when water temperatures are around 50 degrees. After turnover it is walleye time again. Fish steep breaks, deep weed lines, and deep structure. Use live bait – chubs or small suckers, but jigging blade baits also works. Usually fish in 15 to 25 feet of water. The bite window is often short and remember you are again fishing in clear water conditions. Early mornings are very productive and the bite changes daily. Some days fishing is fast and furious, other days nothing. Many times you will catch smallmouth bass at the same time and location.

Casting at night, either from a boat or from shore, is also productive in the fall. Look for weed edges, over the tops of weeds, or around current areas. The water is clear so often you can see fish with a headlamp, but don't shine the light in their eyes. Spinnerbaits, jerk baits, and blade baits all work, but remember from above – use a slow presentation. The Tenney Locks, the Yahara River, and the railroad trestle on Lake Waubesa are good areas to try. On overcast days use similar techniques.

Madison area shore fishing: April brings in warmer weather and lots of panfish to the shallows. Let's get some club members together to hit some of our known shore fishing spots and use area fishing reports to catch bluegill, crappies and more.
