Winter 1958-1959 -- Lake Mendota

Maybe you've noticed some changes on Lake Mendota this winter season of 1958-1959. Think now its been the coldest winter in many a moon, some 39 years to be exact, resulting in over 22 inches of ice and countless testimonials of fishermen as to the real extent of the weather on hands, face, feet and so forth. The snow cover on the ice has been deeper this year than any since 1951, often making walking difficult. Maybe you've noticed when you chop a fishing hole the water rises above the level of the ice. This is because the weight of the snow is forcing the "floating" ice down deeper into the water.

This year's creel census shows that the perch fishing on Lake Mendota has been good—not only good, but very good! How about the status of the population? Just how "healthy" is it? How have four years of liberalized regulations affected the perch in Lake Mendota? Although we can't answer all the questions as yet, we still can put forward the following observations. The perch population appears to be in a very healthy condition, and hatches of perch have been normal since the new regulations have been in effect. In fact, the hatch of 1957 was tremendous, as is shown by the large numbers of smaller fish being caught this winter. Perch this year appear to be biting much better than was the case for the past two winters, probably due to some environmental or food factor, rather than to any sharp difference in supply of available fish.

A perch, like all other living animals, is continually adjusting his life to fit his environment. Thus, if most of the food is on the bottom of the lake, that is where the fish feed. They adjust their movements and feeding habits according to water temperatures, oxygen conditions, light values, currents, and many other things, some of which we may not even yet know. Thus fishery scientists also brave the cold along with the fishermen in order to learn more about the perch.

Last winter Lake Lab research crews operating echo sounders on Lake Mendota found that many schools of perch were swimming at 30 to 50 feet depths over water that was 60 to 80 feet deep, instead of on the bottom. So far this year the perch appear to be staying closer to the bottom. Continuous echo sounding records over a 24-hour period have shown that perch have different movement patterns during the day as compared to the night. These and other findings will allow fishery scientists to understand better the many inter-actions which are affecting the perch population.


The environment, besides affecting the lives of the perch, also affects the hatch of young fish in the spring. Thus, although the hatch is usually "normal", on occasion a very large hatch occurs and also, infrequently, a very small one. The reasons for this are not completely understood, but probably are a result of weather and food conditions during and after the spring spawning. Thus the success of the perch hatch in any one year is influenced by natural events, and not by the numbers of spawning fish.

All evidence so far strongly indicates that the increased harvest of perch in Lake Mendota is healthy and beneficial not only to the perch population, but also to the recreation of Madisonland's sportsmen.
