

Where to Launch?

After hearing complaints about the boat launches on the Yahara Lakes at an earlier meeting, Dane County Parks personnel, Chris James, Kevin Connors, and Darren Marsh where invited to the January meeting to explain how the county boat launches are managed and financed. Major complaints include crowding, low lake levels, goose droppings, and aquatic weeds. Many members also wondered where the lake access fees actually go in the budgeting process

Darren explained that lake access fees offset operational costs for managing the launches. Dane County is in a cooperative agreement with the Cities of Madison and Monona so that the launch fee is honored at any launch operated by these jurisdictions. The jurisdiction that sells the launch fee keeps the money. So if you buy a launch sticker in Madison, the funds go to Madison, etc.

The problem with the three speakers is that the county only operates four boat launches-Babcock, Goodland, and Lake Farm Parks on Lake Waubesa and Fish Camp on Lake Kegonsa. Many members felt these were some of the best-managed launches on the Madison Lakes. Many of the complaints were from Madison launches and some other launches are managed by other municipalities or the Department of Natural Resources (in Governor Nelson and Lake Kegonsa State Parks). The speakers weren't able to discuss how the other launches were managed or how launch fees were allocated. Overall the County doesn't take in quite enough to offset operational costs of their launches.

With the large population in Dane County, access to launches can be problematic. Chris James believes that launch use is directly related to fishing. When fishing is good, the launches are crowded. Charlie Grimm made a suggestion-retire and fish on Tuesday thru Thursday. Before I took Charlie's advice I found that a good time to launch was about 7 a.m. on a weekend morning. All the "hard-core" anglers were out already and the pleasure boaters didn't start showing up until around 11 a.m. Sundays also seemed to be less busy than Saturdays. Some of the weekend anticipation has worn off. Another thing to watch for is fishing tournaments- either local weekday tournaments or the larger weekend tournaments and avoid those lakes.

Another option is to buy a good pair of waders, a float-tube, kayak or small canoe. These open up a lot of access sites. Just ask one of your ice-fishing buddies. Most know every dead-end street, pumping station, bridge access, or municipal parks where you can get access. You can't "cruise" as far as with you 200 h.p. bass boat but you can fish more carefully and often gain access where the big boats don't or can't go.

It is probably a losing battle to teach people how to launch and retrieve their boats in a timely manner. I admit I may not be the best at backing my boat into the launch but at least when it is my turn the boat is ready to launch. The fishing gear is loaded, straps unhooked, etc. Retrieving can be worse, some people have a penchant for pulling out their boat and stopping right at the access to unload gear, wipe down their boat, hook up straps, etc. My patience usually gets a little short at that point and I've been less than polite with some telling them to get their ****boat out of the way.

Besides launch issues Chris, Kevin, and Darren mentioned some other lake related items that are of interest to the club:

The U.W. Lacrosse is doing a recreational survey of the Madison lakes. How do people use the lakes? The county is looking for volunteers to help with the survey. If you are interested in volunteering to help with the survey contact Kevin or Marsha Hartwig at Dane County.

-As part of lake management, the county is also interested in exotic species control. They plan to put tools at the boat launches to help remove aquatic plants from boating equipment.

-There are plans to repair the Babcock and Lake Kegonsa dams so there will be better water level management in the lakes and easier navigation through the dams. If you have a water level issue talk to Kevin.

Fish info for below the Dells Dam

(To Kevin Tvedten)

The attached spread sheets show the electrofishing catch rate of walleye from six different locations on Lake Wisconsin and the Wisconsin River below the Dells Dam. The data shows the number of fish per mile of electrofishing and is an average of all six stations. The less than 10 inch fish roughly estimate the young of the year from that particular year, the 10-15 inch fish are 1+ year olds, the 15-20 inch fish are 2+-5+.

The summary averages show that statistically the average catch of 10-15" fish has gone down, the average catch of 15-20 inch fish has stayed the same and the average catch of greater than 20 inch fish has increased from 0.49 fish per mile to 1.37 fish per mile. Also if you rank the years by the catch rate of greater than 20 inch fish the top four years are check to the club's post offce box: all after the slot limit and the worst four years are all before the slot limit (excluding 2009 when the sample time period was moved later in the year).

> You'll also see that as we discussed there was a big year class in 09. those showed up again in 2010 as 10-15 inch fish and this last fall as 15-20 inchers. This data only is looking at the walleye response to the slot limit and not the sauger population. Any questions let me know and I would be happy to come and talk to the club some time. (Editor - Kevin is working to bring Dave to a club meeting.)

News from Charlie Grimm on the Warner Park Lagoon

The club's board discussed at the January meeting the ongoing Warner Park Lagoon issues. Let's start out by saying, once again, a big thank you to Jack Hurst for his long and determined fight in regards to this. Jack, along with the group Wild Warner, has worked hard to protect and restore this important area for spawning and fishing habitat. Several years ago, the Madison Fishing Expo gave our club \$12,000 to be used for dredging of the lagoon. After many setbacks and other requirements from the DNR and the City of Madison, the money remains in our bank account. The latest obstacle is a complete series of tests for the water, sand, mud, etc. to determine how badly the lagoon has been mis-treated, that is required before any further progress can be made. This is a very expensive undertaking. The board voted to use \$2,000 to help this be acomplished. Many of us feel, of course, that one of the worst problems facing the health of the lagoon is the annual Rythym 'n Booms fireworks and all the debris that falls into the water. Stay tuned.
