Tip-Up Rigging for Pike and Walleyes

The winter ice fishing season is finally upon us and it's time to get out those tip-ups and make sure that they are ready for the winter. I use and recommend that you buy quality tip-ups because they will last and perform much better than cheaper tip-ups. Two of the better brands that are available are the Beaver Dam and the Frabill tip-ups. One of the main reasons for using a better tip-up is that the better ones can be lubricated every season. The Beaver Dam's can be unsoldered, lubricated with a product called Blue Lube, and re-soldered. The Frabill tip-up can be disassembled and also lubricated. This allows your spool to spin better and give a running fish the line it may need. Cheaper tip-ups cannot be lubricated and can freeze up on you in extreme weather. Now, that you have a couple of quality tip-ups here's some suggestions for rigging your tip-ups for pike

and for walleye. For big pike, I like to use a braided Dacron line like the Berkley Gorilla brand line in 60 to 80 pound test. This line gives you the diameter that you need to fight fish, especially big pike. Next, get a Quick-Set rig (Bait Rigs or Smith Bait Co. make good ones) that holds up and gives you the chance to release fish. The Bait Rigs Quick Set Rig has a swivel on the end that you tie your line directly to with two single hooks welded together (Britain's Partridge Hooks are used). The one large hook is put into the bait (Golden shiners, shiners, and smelt) and the small hook is loose. Lastly, use a rubber core sinker or a couple split shots to keep your bait down at the desired depth you want to target.

Rigging your tip-ups for walleyes is a little different than the pike set-ups. Use slightly smaller diameter line (Berkley Gorilla Braid works) in 40 pound test and even a higher test is o.k. because you're going to use a fluorocarbon leader in front of the braid. This diameter line is easy on your hands and helps again to fight the fish. Tie a swivel on the end of the Gorilla line and then tie on about 30 to 36" inches of Vanish fluorocarbon to a #8 treble hook. Try using the "new" red hooks on one of your tip-ups because some people are swearing by them. Again, you should use a split shot or two to keep your bait down and put the shot about 15" up from the treble hook. For walleyes, I like to use 3 to 5" inch fathead minnows, if I can find them that big this time of year. Hook the minnows through the back just behind the fathead's dorsal fin.

Tip-up rigging, continued.

Here are some ideas of good areas to put your tip-ups near;

1) the greenest weeds you can find. Pike cruise these shallows regularly, but walleyes will even bury themselves in the weeds waiting to ambush their prey.

2) Drill all your holes first over a large area, so you don't continually spook fish by drilling new holes. Space your tip-ups along the first break and try to cover different depths in the water column.

3) Concentrate on depths from 5 to 15 feet for pike and have a few deeper rigs set up for walleyes. If you can find rock bars scatter your tip-ups around the bar from the shallowest top of the bar to the deeper sides.

Start with good equipment and go from there. The new electronic flashers are great and really help when fishing deeper water for perch and or suspended fish. If fishing 10 feet and under, you can get by without using fancy electronics. A good lake map can help you improve your fishing on any lake, especially if the lake is new to you. You can mark a map in advance of fishing and zero in on the lake's hot-spots before venturing out on the ice. Try to do as much research on any lake before venturing out to fish. Most importantly, safety first!


If you can't be at the January meeting, please let one of the Board Members know so he can throw your idea into the mix.


