Icing Lake Michigan Trout

I get some practice in the winter pulling six inch bluegills through a five inch hole so the potential of pulling a big fish, brown trout in this case, held a lot of intrigue for me. Ben Kueng, a Milwaukee area guide told us how to do it at the monthly meeting, then the following Saturday we went to the Milwaukee Marina and put talk into practice with Ben's help.


Although the Great Lakes don't usually freeze over in the winter many of the harbors, bays, marinas, and inflowing rivers do, so there is the potential for ice-fishing for Great Lakes trout. Ben concentrates his efforts on the southern portion of Lake Michigan, mentioning the harbors and marinas at Milwaukee, Racine, Kenosha, and Sheboygan as potential fishing locations. He prefers fishing in the Milwaukee Marina because it doesn't have a river flowing into it. This keeps the water clarity more consistent and the ice is probably safer. You want two-to-three feet of visibility for fishing. The other harbors have rivers so water clarity changes more quickly. I liked the Milwaukee Marina because it was easy to get to, just take I-94 to Milwaukee and follow the signs on I-794. The parking was ample, the area wasn't crowded, even on the weekend, and the fishing was right there. You didn't have to walk two miles to the fishing hole. Another Milwaukee location Ben suggested was the Summerfest lagoons. I saw an outdoors show on television where they were using the same techniques we did on a river by Sheboygan. It didn't mention the name of the river, but it was a smaller stream, I don't think it was the Sheboygan River. I suspect there are other harbors and marinas farther north along Lake Michigan and along Lake Superior that hold trout in the winter. I know they fish for lake trout around the Apostle Islands off of Bayfield. Some more exploring may be in order.

Our primary targets were brown trout and

steelheads. Four different techniques were used to fish for them. The first was the Automatic Ice Fisherman. This is a rig that is a pole holder where you arch the pole over and hook the tip guide in a peg and string the line out on an arm. You leave some slack in the line that is held down by a weight (generally a float). When a fish hits

it pulls up the weight on the line and trips the pole that snaps up and hooks the When fish. fishing trout you should watch the float. lf starts going up or jiggling, get ready to set the hooks. Trout can be notoriously light biters and may not trip the rod. loose drag on the reel keeps the

fish from breaking the line until you reach the pole. The reel is spooled with eight to ten pound monofilament line with a six to eight foot, six-pound fluorocarbon leader. Spawn sacs are used for bait and they are held on with a number 6 or 8 Gamagkatsu or Eagle Claw octopus type hook. Colored hooks can be used; red is probably the best color. The bait is set close to the bottom, about six inches up. The Automatic Fisherman is

available with two different rods. For trout or other larger fish, I recommend the stiffer rod. Another item we used with the Automatic Fisherman was the Ice-Stopper bobber. This is a hollow float that you fill with a de-icing agent and run your line through it. It prevents your line from freezing in the hole. For more information on Automatic Ice Fisherman gear go to their website www.automaticicefisherman.com. Automatic Fisherman type rigs have been used in the Apostle Islands area for years. I think I have plans for making them, if I can find them. I think the plans came from In-Fisherman magazine. With a search of the WEB you could probably find plans to make your

The second and third techniques are jigging rigs. The line set-up is the same for the Automatic Fisherman, although the pole I was using had superline on it and I remembered why I didn't like superline for ice fishing. It ices-up a lot easier than monofilament. Jigging spoons such as Swedish Pimples and Do-Jiggers are two recommended lures. I'm not too good on size, but they were "medium" sized, not big or small. Silver and green or silver and blue are the recommended colors unless the water is turbid, then gold, brass, or copper colors are preferred. Minnow heads were hooked on to the jigging spoons. Another lure option is 3-to-4 inch, white tube bait with a jig head inside. I also saw some Mr. Zips on some of the rods. A quarter-once jig head with a Berkley Gulp minnow is another jig rig. The jigging motion is similar to that used for panfish and you should be fishing close to the bottom, but every oncein-awhile jig up higher in case some fish are suspended. I was thinking of taking one of my jig poles, but I am glad I didn't. My poles and reels are kind of "wimpy" for landing a big trout.

The second jigging technique is with spawn sacs. The rod is set up with a slip-bobber so the bait is just suspended above the bottom. Then the rod is jigged to attract fish to the bait.

The final technique is tip-ups. The tip-ups are baited with minnows on a size #8 or #10 treble hook. This technique is recommended in turbid water. Bait deserves a paragraph of its own. For

minnows Ben prefers lake shiners. For spawn, the fresher the better, and Ben likes smaller sized spawn sacks, about the size of a marble, than are usually available commercially. He also changes the spawn once an hour so you always have fresh bait on the line. For us Madison area folks that don't fish over there regularly I see getting good spawn as the most difficult problem. Ben recommends Bob's Bait at the corner of Highway 100 and Greenfield Avenue in Milwaukee as a good source of bait, although he thinks Bob's spawn sacs are too big and he cuts them down and reties them if he uses Bob's spawn.

Landing big trout through a hole in the ice also needs a special technique. First you want to use an abrasion resistant line. I think something like Berkley's XT would be good. Ben uses Berkley professional grade fluorocarbon line for leaders. He doesn't think Barkley's Vanish or P-line are as good. You want to keep the line center in the hole when a fish is on. Don't let the line rub against the side of the hole. When landing the fish use a pumping action. Lift the rod and crank it down toward the water. Don't try cranking the fish in when it is running and taking out the drag. All you do is twist the line. Setting the drag is critical, especially when using only six-to-ten pound line. If the drag is too loose you never land the fish. If the drag is too tight, the fish breaks off. A fast person with a gaff is also good,

Where to fish in the marina? – look for corners, docks, points and walls. These are structures that the fish follow when moving around the marina. They also move along troughs in the bottom if you can find them. The trout are constantly moving in the marina so it is better to stick with a hole and let the trout move to you than to do a lot of "hole hopping". Use patience and try adjusting the depth of your presentation if you are not getting bites. As an example Ben said if he was fishing three lines in twelve feet of water he would set one line six- inches to one-foot above the bottom, one at eight feet down and one at four feet down. Trout are extremely "spooky" so Ben doesn't like to

use depth finders or underwater cameras. He also doesn't recommend using rattling jigs. For safety reasons Ben fishes on the inner half of the Milwaukee Marina. Although watching him drill holes I don't think there was any safety problem with ice thickness when we where there. He provided a map at the meeting of some of his favorite fishing locations.

So how well did we do on the outing? For me I had a banner day. One 36-inch brown trout made my season. I'm ready to go back for another try. In general the fishing was slow. The total crew caught four fish, one northern pike, two browns, and one steelhead. One brown and I think the steelhead was caught jigging with Swedish Pimples. The big brown was caught on the Automatic Fisherman and spawn. I don't know what the northern was caught on. Others still had some excitement with broken lines or early release fish. For eating, Ben recommends not keeping any browns over five pounds but most steelheads are smaller fish so are better table fare. The equipment for ice-fishing trout is a lot more simple and inexpensive compared to trolling for trout or salmon in the open water.

A Proposal from Kurt Welke, DNR


I would like to bring to the Yahara Fishing Clubs' memberships attention a pending proposal to change the current southern Wi walleye reg from 5 fish X 15" X 18'. This will be up for a vote at the April 11 Conservation Congress spring hearing. I will be coming to the 3/8 mtg with pamphlets, etc., but would like you to post this on the web. FYI, the Mad lakes are exempted from the proposal because to me, they did not meet the justification or objectives found in other waters: fishing pressure on walleyes is far below that for panfish, bass and perch. We do not have much natural reproduction so having potential spawners does not equate with or guarantee more fish, and 3rd; current size structure from our work does not suggest a cut off at the size limit- to the contrary, in Monona, Waubesa and Kegonsa, there is a large % of fish well beyond 15" and up to 29". More on that if you like...
