Musky Moon Madness

Put on your astronomer's hat, it may make you a better musky angler, at least according to Adam Oberfoell at the April YFC meeting. Feeding windows are everything in musky fishing and you have to put everything in your favor to catch big muskies. Moon phase is one thing that helps predict when a feeding window might occur and sometimes, they are very short.

Adam admits that weather conditions eclipse moon phase and other factors and he likes to be fishing when a weather front is approaching or during big winds. A new moon is the preferred phase with a full moon second and there are major and minor feeding times. You can Google fishing times to find major and minor times and they are often published in places like *In-Fisherman* magazine. You can visit infisherman.com to search month-to-month for the best times at specific locations. Phone apps with moon data include musky 360, MHtV, and Google play/Apple store. Major feeding times occur when the moon is overhead or underfoot, and minors occur at moon rise or moon set. It never hurts to be fishing at sunrise and sunset. The reasons for feeding windows correlating with moon phases are not understood but it

might have something to do with gravitational pull. *Continued on page 2*

A VERY TIMELY AND IMPORTANT TOPIC FOR OUR MAY MEETING

We all care deeply about the future of the sport of fishing. So what does climate change mean for it? At our May 8th meeting, UW-Madison Center for Limnology research scientist Zach Feiner will discuss climate change's effects on Wisconsin lakes and fishing. The meeting starts at 7 but arrive at 6 p.m. for a mini session by Don Golembiewski, who will share his expertise on fly fishing for bluegills and bass.

During a full moon the brighter conditions can stimulate feeding as the muskies are better able to spot and chase prey. During a new moon the lack of moonlight creates darker conditions making muskies more comfortable and less wary, leading to increased feeding.

What I gathered from Adam's talk was that musky fishing is basically scouting. We go out and pound the water for hours and get excited if we have a strike or a follow. These may not be feeding fish, but the information is valuable. Be back at those locations when a feeding window is predicted and don't give up, either time wise or location wise. In other words, you can set an alarm for a preferred feeding time, head to the best site, and be prepared with your best lures or bait. Timing is critical. Some spots are productive only under very specific conditions. Multiple fish can be caught during a short feeding window. Stay on a good spot. Success comes when you realize you want to be on the water when the fish are feeding.

On the other hand, if you aren't a dedicated musky angler and just want to catch a musky Adam recommends using a one-ounce spinnerbait with a single trailer hood and a grub tail. Work it along the outer edge of a weed line. Big plastics and top waters with a side-to-side wobble also work.

In a related topic there is a very interesting article in the May 2024 issue of In-Fisherman magazine on tracking trophy muskies and their home ranges. I recommend you read it if you are a musky angler. Home ranges varied greatly depending on the size and depth of the lake but for Leech Lake, Minnesota for instance, the home ranges of tracked muskies varied from 494 to 2,324 acres. Many muskies had two summer home ranges, a large, deep, and cool home range they use for feeding and a smaller, shallower, and warmer one they use for digestion. They may migrate between the two daily. Big Bertha, a Lake Wabigoon resident musky traveled six miles between her feeding range and digestion range on a daily basis.

Doug Galloway recorded Adam's talk, transcribed it, and used an AI tool to summarize it. It provides more details on moon phase than can be included in this article. For those that are interested it is posted on the Members Only page (https://yaharafishingclub.org/members-only/) of the YFC website.

Clement's Fishing Barge, Genoa: The walleye spawn is over but now the better post spawn bite is on! Smallmouth bass are in big and bluegills and other panfish are showing up too! And don't forget that you may tussle with sturgeon, a paddlefish and so much more. Let's go Friday, May 10th but other dates are possible too. Cost is \$25 for adults and only \$5 for kids 5-15 years old. This is a great shore fishing opportunity to fish in a prime location that would normally need a boat to get to.

Port Washington Coho and Steelhead charter fishing: June 7th and 13th are dates we have reserved with Captain John of Iverson Sportfishing. 




