FACTS TO REMEMBER

DEFINITION OF FISHING: "Fishing" includes taking, capturing, killing or fishing for fish of any variety in any manner. It is unlawful to use or have in your possession a spear on game fish water except for use on carp and suckers. It is also unlawful to snag fish in any manner or to use or have goldfish in your possession. Fish lines and hooks are not to be left unattended. Game fish and pan fish should not be used as bait and it is unlawful to transport live rough fish such as carp, dogfish, garfish, lawyer, eelpout and lamprey eels and smelt as bait.

A fisherman who is a good sportsman takes only the number of fish he can actually use—complies with all fishing license requirements—cleans up his camp site and does not throw cans, bottles or refuse into streams. He recognizes and respects the property rights of others.

All licenses issued by the Wisconsin Conservation Department or its authorized agents must be signed by and be carried on the person of the licensee to be effective.

Resident licenses sold for a \$3.25 fee expire December 31. They are required of persons 16 to 65 years of age. No applicant is eligible for a resident fishing license who has not been a resident of Wisconsin for a period of 6 months prior to the date of application.

The first duty of every sportsman is to observe the letter of the law and the spirit of good sportsmanship. It is also his duty to encourage others to obey the law and prevent violations and unsportsmanlike acts whenever possible.

CURRENT MANAGEMENT PRACTICES IN LAKES AND STREAMS

For the past few years, much time and money has been expended in taking an inventory of our lakes and streams in southern Wisconsin. This is a laborious and slow process, but it is a most essential part of a management program for our inland waters. We must know something about each body of water before an intelligent stocking or management program can be undertaken.

In connection with this long-range program, biological surveys have been conducted on many of our lakes

and streams. A biological survey gives us an idea of the fish population already existing in a given body of water, the amount of food available to the fish population, the extent of available spawning areas, the abundance of aquatic vegetation, the number of forage fish, and the general physical and chemical conditions of the water.

Currently our stream management program involves the marking of trout in a number of our trout streams to determine the relationship between stocked and native fish and to learn whether the marked or hatchery fish are constituting an important part of the angler's catch. In addition certain streams, selected on the basis of water quality, natural reproduction and trout potential, are stocked with fingerling trout early in the year. In these streams the fingerling trout have a high rate of survival, excellent growth and provide quality angling the following season.

Land acquisition is a top priority program. In an effort to better manage our fisheries it is necessary to acquire lands for the protection, preservation and development of spawning grounds, public access to lakes and streams, and stream improvement.

Often the inconsiderate minority place this program in jeopardy. The conduct of the sportsmen using the area plays a vital role in our ability to negotiate with the land owners for these needed lands. Don't let unsportsmenlike conduct, littering, waste and game law violations spoil your future good fishing and hunting.
