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Smallie Success with Ned Rigs and Other Top Lures

Bill Schultz, the March YFC speaker, says clean out your tackle box. All you the lures you need to catch smallmouth you can fit in a cereal bowl. You can catch a large number of smallmouths with a small number of lures.

The top lure or at least the rigging is the Ned rig. The Ned rig is named for Ned Kehde. Kehde claims he didn't invent the technique but he popularized it. It is a refinement of the Midwest finesse bass fishing technique. Kehde didn't start with all the Ned Rig equipment available today. He just cut down readily available stick worms to a smaller size.

Today Ned rigs consists of a jig head that holds a plastic tail in a vertical position when it sits on the bottom. The jig heads are pill shaped. Z-Man are the top plastics for the Ned rig. They are tough and they float so they stand up off the bottom. The most common resemble a small stick worm but they come in a variety of styles including the Canada Craw, TRD HogZ, Hula Stick, TicklerZ, and probably others.

APRIL MEETING: FISHING TRIBUTARIES FOR SALMON AND TROUT? YES PLEASE.

<u>Notes from the President on page 4</u> <u>Spring and summer club outing opportunities on pages 4 and 5</u> The most common presentation is the hop and bounce, but it can also be retrieved with a swim and glide, a drag and dead stick, or a straight swim.

Bill fishes a lot in the clear waters of Green Bay and Lake Michigan so he uses long casts, let it settle, then twitch-twitch, let it settle and repeat.

Bill's favorite color for this fishing is green pumpkin goby. The Z-Man plastics float so even on a dead stick presentation they float off the bottom and quiver seductively to catch fish. Bill likes the 2³/₄-inch size the best. Jig size depends on the depth of the water you are fishing. A word of warning: Don't mix the Z-Man tails with other plastics. You will end up with a gooey mess.

The second favorite of Bill's lures is the Keitech Fat Swing Impact. These are fished on a half-round jig head. The favorite size is 2.8 inches and the favorite colors are smoke salt and pepper, black shad, and goby. A problem, Keitech tails are fragile and rip apart after catching a few fish. He uses long casts, and a slow steady retrieve at the desired depth. Chartreuse-colored Gopher jig heads are his favorite half-round jig heads.

Bill also stream fishes for smallmouth. He uses the Keitech lures here but his favorite may be the Rebel Teeny Wee Crawfish. It can be used as a floater/diver; it bounces off rocks and bottom, it has a tight wiggle with a rattle, and it has a realistic crawfish look. It is only 1.5 inches in size and Bill trades the rear size 14 treble hooks for size 10. Use a slow and steady retrieve, a slow-fast retrieve, a jerk-pause retrieve, or as a topwater lure. He also uses tube jigs.

There are also other techniques he has caught smallmouths on but presently doesn't use much. Wacky-rigging, drop shotting, and hair jigs are effective techniques but they are slow. You can't cover a lot of water using them.

I won't get into detail about Bill's favorite rod and reels. His general preference is a plus or minus seven foot medium-fast action rod. His line preference is 8-10 pound J-braid line with a 3-4 foot fluorocarbon leader. He has fancy electronics on his boat but he uses them primarily for depth, water temperature, and time of day. He often sees other anglers cruising past fish looking for fish on their electronics.

Wisconsin Conservation Congress Spring Hearings

The annual spring hearings will be held Monday, April 14th, at 6 p.m. The Dane County meeting will be at McFarland High School. The Conservation Congress was formed in 1934 by Aldo Leopold and others to give citizens a voice in natural resources management. Each county elects five delegates who advise the DNR and the Natural Resources Board. At the Spring Hearings citizens are able to vote on proposed rule changes and citizen-introduced resolutions. This is where many changes to our fishing and hunting rules originate. We are the only state in the nation that has such a system, so take advantage and make your opinions heard. You can attend the meeting in person to elect delegates, hear arguments for the proposed changes, and vote for or against them. 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trout stamp to bring home some coho, rainbows or browns!

Mississippi Backwaters

We had a successful outing on the Mississippi backwaters two weekends ago but with the colder weather hanging on there is still time to go as it hasn't hit its peak yet. We are planning a trip to possibly Trempealeau or La Crosse to hunt down the biggest perch of the year! This will be a day outing for sure and possibly a multiday outing with enough interest.

Clements Fishing Barge

April is "river time" and anything is possible on the river! Things haven't really got going yet with the colder weather except for a few nicer days. This is a great outing for kids and adults and no boat is needed as you will get a ride across the river to the barge where you can fish all day. Cost is \$25 per adult and \$5 for kids 15 and under. Before the March club meeting, Kurt Welke provided an excellent mini session on how to prepare a perfect shore lunch.




